Community Shredding Event

On Saturday, October 15th, the City of Ormond Beach partnered with the Ormond Beach Morgan Stanley Smith Barney (MSSB) office, Halifax Urban Ministries (HUM), and Iron Mountain, Inc., to provide a free community shredding event for citizens to bring their no longer needed sensitive documents for shredding.

In exchange for shredding services, citizens were asked to bring non-perishable food items for donation to HUM. The event was held from 9:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. at the Ormond Beach City Hall parking lot.

Citizens were able to watch their documents shredded to an irretrievable form. It was a great opportunity to clear out unneeded documents while also supporting HUM with donations.

At the end of the event, 6,000 pounds of shredding had been done (all of which will be recycled); 4,000 pounds of food was donated to HUM along with \$850.00 in checks, cash and Publix Gift Cards. Some citizens showed up without any shredding but just came to donate food or money. Ormond Beach citizens are the best!

To thank the citizens for shredding and donating, each was given a goody bag which included information on preventing identity theft, recycling, and energy conservation.

This event went so well that we hope to partner with MSSB in the future for another Community Shredding Event!

Walking with the Manager

At Thursday's Walking with the City Manager, residents were guided through the City's on-going Alcazar, Buena Vista Drainage Improvement project.

They were informed that although this project started out as a drainage improvement project, recent developments with regard to the City Commission's concern over the City's aging water system infrastructure and their desire to upgrade the system provided an opportunity to implement the first phase of what has been identified as the 2-inch water main replacement program. Approximately 7,000 feet of old 2-inch galvanized steel pipe water mains will be replaced with new 8-inch and 4-inch PVC water main as part of this project. Finally, it was mentioned that the City also took the opportunity to include addressing the neighborhood's need for resurfacing of the streets with this project. After completion of the underground utility work, the roads in this area will be resurfaced.

By combining the two utility projects and the road resurfacing into one project, the City was able to save an estimated 20% in construction costs. This savings could be as much as \$200,000 based on the \$960,000 construction cost.



Pine Trail Students Tour The Casements



National Prescription Drug Take Back Day

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) has scheduled another National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on **Saturday, October 29, 2011, from 10:00 am - 2:00 pm.** to provide a venue for persons who want to dispose of unwanted and unused prescription drugs. The Ormond Beach Police Department is a certified collection site for this event. Expired, unused, or unwanted prescription drugs may be dropped off at the lobby of the Police Department located at 170 West Granada Blvd.

National Prescription Drug Take Back Day addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. More than seven million Americans currently abuse prescription drugs, according to the 2009 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's National Survey on Drug Use and Health. Each day, approximately, 2,500 teens use prescription drugs to get high for the first time according to the Partnership for a Drug Free America. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including the home medicine cabinet.

DEA, in conjunction with state and local law enforcement agencies throughout the United States, conducted National Prescription Drug Take Back Days on Saturday, September 25, 2010, and April 25, 2011. Nearly, 4,000 state and local law enforcement agencies throughout the nation participated in these events collecting more than 309 tons of pills.

Four days after last fall's Take-Back Day, Congress passed legislation amending the Controlled Substances Act to allow the DEA to develop a process for people to safely dispose of their prescription drugs. DEA immediately began developing this process after President Obama signed the Safe and Secure Drug Disposal Act of 2010 on October 12. Until that process is complete, DEA will continue to hold Take Back Days every six months.

Embry-Riddle Students Visit Ormond Beach Municipal Airport

On Thursday, October 13th, 2011, students from the Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University Airport Management Club (AMC) toured the control tower facility at the Ormond Beach Municipal Airport (OBMA) and met with the Airport Manager and the Control Tower Manager to discuss airport and air traffic management issues. The students were also provided an opportunity to observe air traffic control operations.

The AMC is comprised of approximately 25 students, and is a student affiliate chapter of the American Association of Airport Executives and the Florida Airports Council. It is chartered to encourage interest by students in an airport management career. The Club sponsors tours and guest speakers, and promotes airport internships for students.

Although most career opportunities are to be found at commercial airports, general aviation airports like OBMA provide an alternate opportunity - a chance to experience a broader management perspective as compared to the career specialization that typically occurs at a larger, commercial airport.

AMC students are also interested in air traffic control and its implications for airport operations. This trip to the Ormond Beach air traffic control tower provided an "up close" opportunity to see air traffic control operations "in action" at a busy general aviation airport.

From US 17 to Cone Road in Volusia County

Access Management Public Hearing

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District Five, invites you to an access management public hearing concerning two State Road (SR) 40 design projects in Volusia County. The hearing will be held on Thursday, November 10, 2011 at the Salty Church, Oasis Campus, located at 85 South Tymber Creek Road in Ormond Beach, Florida 32174. This hearing is being held to afford interested persons an opportunity to express their views concerning the proposed access management improvements which involves widening SR 40 from a two-lane roadway to a four-lane roadway, and includes a 40-foot-wide grassed median. The hearing begins with an informal open house at 5:30 p.m. followed by a formal presentation at 6:30 p.m. The hearing ends at 7:30 p.m.

Public participation is solicited without regard to race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, disability or family status. Persons who require special accommodations under the Americans with Disabilities Act or persons who require translation services, free of charge, should contact: Mr. Bill Walsh, FDOT project manager at (386) 943-5411 or by e-mail to William.

Project Overview

The limits of the design projects are from United States Highway (US) 17 to Cone Road, a distance of approximately 14 miles. The design proposes to widen SR 40 from a two-lane roadway to a four-lane roadway in order to improve safety and mobility. The projects also include drainage improvements, wildlife crossings, and median modifications. Construction of a raised median is expected to change access to businesses and homes throughout this corridor.
