

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, a special group of about 300 teenagers at the Tomoka Christian Church spent this summer reaching out to our community in Ormond Beach. They called it a "*summer with a purpose*" or "Purpose 50"; and

WHEREAS, the teenagers participating in Purpose 50 have done jobs such as painting houses and office buildings, raking leaves, spreading mulch, passing out water to beachgoers on the beach, and hosting a dance for an association of mentally challenged individuals. They visited the Ormond-In-The-Pines Assisted Living Facility monthly and offered a bicycle ministry that collected unwanted bicycles, repairing them to like "new condition" and then giving them to families in need. Over 500 bicycles have been given away this year, even the old bicycle parts were recycled; and

WHEREAS, the teenagers also conduct an annual Christmas new shoes giveaway whereby they collect new shoes and give them away just before Christmas to families in need. Last year they gave away 361 pairs and their goal is to give away 500 pairs of new shoes this year; and

WHEREAS, the students are eager to serve and are taught to be excellent in all they do and to value others from all places in life and backgrounds; and


WHEREAS, the City of Ormond Beach is blessed to have these dedicated young men and women serve our community;


