Crime Stoppers Annual Banquet

The Crime Stoppers Law Enforcement Officer of the Year nominees were honored during the Crime Stoppers 14th Annual Community Banquet held on May 16, 2012, at the Plaza Resort and Spa in Daytona Beach.

This year, the Ormond Beach Police Department selected Officer Jeremy Smith as its nominee. Over the past year, Ofc. Smith and his K-9 partner, Dawny have been the impetus for numerous arrests. During this time frame, almost every arrest and seizure that he has been involved in, have been self-initiated. As a team, they have made forty-one arrests, both felony and misdemeanor, for narcotics violations and outstanding warrants. They have seized 124 grams of cannabis, 21 grams of crack cocaine, fifty illegal pills, and 2 grams of powder cocaine. Additionally, 4 vehicles were seized and over 19,000 dollars in U.S. currency was taken off the streets.

City Commission Meetings Go Paperless

To that end, the City recently began using IQM2, Inc., end to end meeting automation system called MinuteTraq to continue achieving these goals by streamlining internal business processes. This new system allows for the elimination of redundant, paper based and labor intensive public meeting processes so staff can more effectively deliver critical information to the Ormond Beach community.

In addition to going paperless, our citizens will be able to access and search public meeting information from any place in the world via the enhanced Public Meeting Portal for all City Commission Meetings.

We urge our citizens to take advantage of this new feature to stay informed and be involved with City issues that are important to them.

Emergency Communication Made Easy

The City of Ormond Beach has contracted with Emergency Communications Network to license its CodeRED high-speed notification solution. The CodeRED system provides city officials the ability to quickly deliver messages to targeted areas or the entire city.

Notification systems such as CodeRED are only as good as the telephone number database supporting them. If your phone number is not in the database, you will not be called. One of the reasons the CodeRED system was selected is that it gives individuals and businesses the ability to add their own phone numbers directly into the system's database which is an extremely important feature.

No one should automatically assume his or her phone number is included. The City of Ormond Beach is urging all individuals and businesses to log onto the City's website, <http://www.ormondbeach.org/alerts> and click the "Register Now" link on the Emergency Information page. Those without Internet access may call the City at 386-676-3225 to supply their information over the phone. You will be required to provide your first and last name, street address (physical address, no P.O. boxes), city, state, zip code, primary phone number, and any additional phone numbers as well.

All businesses should register, as well as all individuals who have unlisted phone numbers, those who have changed their phone number or address within the past year, and those who use a cellular phone or VoIP phone as their primary number.

CodeRED allows for geographically based delivery, which means street addresses are required to ensure emergency notification calls are received by the proper individuals in a given situation. The system also works for cell phones, but an associated street address is required in order to provide relevant messages.

CodeRED gives those who want to be included an easy and secure method for inputting information. The data collected will only be used for emergency notification purposes and is exempt from public disclosure.

In addition, public safety alerts will also be provided through the company's new public safety app – CodeRED Mobile Alert. The app, which is a free download for iPhone and Android subscribers, will allow residents, as well as those traveling through the area, to receive community and emergency alerts via notifications to their smartphones. The app works similar to the current CodeRED system. If you have the app downloaded and are in the affected area of the alert, a notification will be sent through the app to alert you. Residents who have enrolled in the CodeRED System will continue to receive voice calls, text messages and emails; however, the app is designed to keep users safe and informed while on the go. The app feature is unique because if a resident is traveling to another state that also uses the CodeRED system, they will receive community or emergency alerts from that specific area as well which provides an extra way to stay safe when away from home. This additional outlet for Ormond Beach to communicate time-sensitive messages to residents and visitors is at no additional cost to the current contract with Emergency Communications Network.

Emergency, community and missing children alerts are always free to app users. The app also provides subscribers a free, 30-day trial of CodeRED Weather Warning, which alerts users if they are in the direct path of a severe thunderstorm, tornado or flash flood. Users have the ability to select the types of weather notifications they want to receive, to customize the app based on their unique preferences. The weather component, if chosen, means you don't have to worry about missing a tornado siren or watching a weather report. The app will alert you immediately after the National Weather Service issues a severe weather warning, no matter the time of day.

Residents with iPhones and Android smartphones are encouraged to download the app to begin receiving notifications. The app is available for a free download on the iTunes store and Google Play. Today's children spend less time playing outside than any previous generation, but 213 cities and towns, including the City of Ormond Beach, earned recognition from national non-profit KaBOOM! as 2012 Playful City USA communities for their efforts to increase play opportunities for children.

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, play is critical to healthy brain development. It allows children to use their creativity while simultaneously developing imagination, dexterity and physical, cognitive and emotional strength. Yet today's children spend less time playing outside than any previous generation in part because only 1-in-5 live within walking distance of a park or playground. The resulting play deficit is having profound consequences for kids physically, socially and academically.

Playful City USA, presented by The Humana Foundation, is a national program advocating for local policies that increase play opportunities for children and is a key platform in combating the play deficit.

KaBOOM!, the national non-profit organization dedicated to saving play, created Playful City USA in 2007 to help local governments address the play deficit and it is through mayors, city council members, parks and recreation departments, school districts and community leaders that the program succeeds in benefitting children.

Hailing from 41 states, the 213 Playful City USA honorees range in size from six-time honorees such as Orlando and Phoenix to first-time recipient Independence, Oregon (population: 9,607). These Playful City USA communities are making a commitment to play and physical activity by developing unique local action plans to increase the quantity and quality of play in their community.

"Some of the most innovative concepts and cost-effective programs are being developed in Playful City USA communities," says Darell Hammond, Founder and CEO of KaBOOM! and author of *The New York Times* Best Seller [KaBOOM!: How One Man Built a Movement to Save Play](#). "Cities like Ormond Beach are key allies in the fight to combat the play deficit and serve as outstanding role models for government and community leaders across the country."

Each of the 2012 Playful City USA communities demonstrated creative commitments to addressing the play deficit. Playful City USA celebrates and highlights these unique initiatives developed by communities across the country. A primary goal of Playful City USA is to encourage cities and towns to share ideas, concepts and programs in an effort to increase play opportunities for children.

KaBOOM! selected Ormond Beach for its outstanding dedication to play. Ormond Beach recently completed its Limitless Playground at the Sports Complex. The City engages civic groups and volunteers to expand play opportunities and is partnering with the R.O.M.P (Renovate, Ormond's, Magic Forest, Playground) Committee in raising dollars to renovate the play icon in Ormond Beach.

The 213 Playful City USA communities are now eligible for \$15,000, \$20,000 and \$30,000 grants via Let's Play, a community partnership led by Dr Pepper Snapple Group, to get kids and families active nationwide. Grant recipients will be announced on June 4, 2012.

The participants will be put into groups nightly, based on their level of play, which can change as they progress. Nova Gym has a divider and two nets so the different levels can compete separately each night.



The presentation consisted of 27 items that were discovered during their recent field trip to Central Park, in which the students conducted research during two "In-House Field Trips." During their presentation, each student spoke about an item that was discovered and their research findings. This is part of an ongoing Central Park plant identification project where Leisure Services is teaming up with Pine Trail Elementary to identify and eventually label various plants and wildlife throughout Central Park.



Open Play Volleyball and Pickleball at Nova Community Center



Nova Community Center now offers open play volleyball on Mondays from 5:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. Two courts will be set up inside the gym offering two games simultaneously.

The Center is also now offering open play pickleball. Open play is held Monday-Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The Nova Community Center has two (2) indoor Pickleball courts along with equipment available for use. All players are welcome, from beginners to advanced. Staff is available to explain the basic rules of the game.

What is pickleball? Pickleball is a racquet sport which combines elements of badminton, tennis, and table tennis. The sport is played on a court with the same dimensions as a doubles badminton court. The net is similar to a tennis net, but is mounted two inches lower. The game is played with a hard paddle and a polymer wiffle ball. Although pickleball appears to be very similar to tennis, there are key differences that make pickleball more accessible to a wider range of players.

Originally invented as a backyard pastime, pickleball is now an organized sport represented by national and international governing bodies. Since its inception in 1965, pickleball has spread across the United States and into Canada. The United States Pickleball Association estimates there are more than 100,000 active pickleball players in the US alone.

The daily use of the Nova Community Center is free to City of Ormond Beach residents with proof of residency and just \$3.75/day for non-residents. The Center, located at 440 N. Nova Road, is open Monday through Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and Sunday 1:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. For more information, please call us at (386) 676-3252.



Officer Smith also received a commendation from the Chief of Police for apprehending three suspects that just committed several car burglaries in the un-incorporated part of the County. A traffic stop for speeding led to the discovery of several stolen GPS units. Those suspects were additionally linked to seven other car burglaries in Apopka as well. Attendees will be welcomed by The Honorable Ed Kelley, Mayor of Ormond Beach.

The invocation will be rendered by Rabbi Howard Schwartz, US Army Major (retired) and the benediction by Chaplain Willie Branch.

Symbols of liberty will overflow into every corner of Rockefeller Gardens as numerous military color guards and color corps enter and assume their positions. Additional groups, including Boy and Girl Scouts will join them.

Guest speaker for the 2012 event is Ray C. Huther. Mr. Huther is a Vice President in the Daytona Beach Area Council of the Navy League of the United States. He is very active in several programs supporting Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard personnel and family readiness groups. Mr. Huther serves on the Council's Ship Team which includes the cruiser USS Gettysburg (CG 64) and the destroyer USS Carney (DDG 64). He is an instructor with the Navy League's Daytona Division US Naval Sea Cadet Corps and an active member of the Navy League's Speakers Bureau.
