The school is also currently putting on their annual "free local clinics" on Saturdays for 3 weeks to locals.






Gymnastics Center



For twenty-three (23) years, Hubert L. Grimes has dedicated himself to judicial service. He broke racial barriers as the first African-American judge in the history of Volusia County when he was elected county judge in 1988. After eleven years of faithful service, in 1999, Grimes was appointed as a circuit judge by then Governor Jeb Bush.

Grimes has taught numerous judicial education courses in Florida on a variety of subjects, as well as, at the National Judicial College in Reno, Nevada from 1993 to 1999. He has also taught criminal law at Bethune-Cookman College, and business law at the University of Central Florida and is currently an adjunct professor at FAMU College of Law in Orlando. His new inspiring book, "How to Keep Your Child from Going to Jail", was released this year and has been a tremendous self-help book enabling parents to regain parental control.

Grimes earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Political Science from Kentucky State University in 1975, a Juris Doctorate from the University of Georgia Law School in 1980, and a graduate degree in Practical Theology from International Seminary in 2004. He served as president of the Florida Conference of County Court Judges from 1996-98, again a first for an African-American. Currently, he is chairman of the Virgil Hawkins Florida Chapter National Bar Association Judicial Council. Grimes is the founder of the Central Florida Community Development Corporation, non-profit housing and minority business incubator, which has successfully operated for over twenty-five years.

A recipient of more than 75 national, state and local awards, Grimes also serves on the Florida Judicial Management Council and numerous Florida Supreme Court committees, and has testified before the legislature on behalf of Florida judges. He is a Reginald Heber Smith Fellow, a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, and is admitted to practice law in both Florida and Georgia. He was recently inducted into the Bartow (Fla.) High School Hall of Fame and was honored by the Children's Home Society as the 2007 Child Advocate of the Year.

Grimes and his wife, Daisy have four children, Tamila, Tiffany, Eburn, and Jamal and four grandchildren. They are actively involved in ministry at Calvary Christian Center of Ormond Beach, Florida.

Fulfilling A
Dream

January 15, 1929 King is born in Atlanta, Georgia, to the Reverend Martin Luther King, Sr. and Alberta Williams King.
February 26, 1951 King is ordained to the Baptist ministry.
June 21, 1954 King graduates from Morehouse College with a B.A. in Sociology.
June 16, 1955 King marries Coretta Scott in Marion, Alabama.
May 17, 1954 King visits Washington, D.C. The United States Supreme Court in "Brown vs. Board of Education" rules segregation in public schools unconstitutional.
October 19, 1954 King is installed as Pastor of Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery, Alabama.
June 5, 1955 King receives doctoral degree in Systematic Theology from Boston University.
December 1, 1955 In Montgomery, Mrs. Rosa Parks refuses to relinquish her bus seat to a white man and is arrested. This incident touches off a massive bus boycott, led by King as president of the Montgomery Improvement Association.
December 21, 1955 After a successful city-wide boycott, Montgomery Bus Company announced integration of all public buses.
February 12, 1957 The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) is founded. King is elected president, and shortly thereafter Time Magazine puts him on its cover.
April 16, 1960 King is invited to a meeting at Shaw University in Raleigh, North Carolina, of college students from around the nation. He urges them to form their own direct action organization. After a speech by Dr. King in the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium, The Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee was born.
April 16, 1963 King writes the famous "Letter from Birmingham Jail" while imprisoned for demonstrating against the segregation of seating facilities in that city.
August 28, 1963 King delivers his "I Have A Dream" speech at the Lincoln Memorial during the "March on Washington", the first massive national integrated protest march in America. Attended by over 200,000 people, the march brought international attention to the civil rights movement.
July 2, 1964 King attends the signing of the Public Accommodations Bill, part of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, by President Lyndon B. Johnson in the White House.
December 10, 1964 King receives the Nobel Peace Prize in Oslo, Norway.
March 21, 1965 Thousands of protesters, protected by Federal troops, begin the march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama. Upon arriving at the state capital, King delivers a speech on voting rights.
August 6, 1965 The 1965 Voting Rights Act is signed into law by President Johnson.
November 27, 1967 King announces the formation by the SCLC of a "Poor People's Campaign", which will aim to help both poor whites and blacks.
March 28, 1968 King leads thousands of protesters in a march through downtown Memphis, Tennessee, in support of striking sanitation workers.
April 3, 1968 King delivers his "I've been to the Mountain Top" speech at the Mason Temple in Memphis, Tennessee.
April 4, 1968 While speaking from the balcony of his hotel room in Memphis, Dr. King is assassinated by a sniper. James Earl Ray is later captured and convicted of murder.
January 19, 1986 After 18 years of intense lobbying by hundreds of leaders of all races, the United States Congress passed Public Law 98-144. On this day, President Ronald Reagan declares the first observance of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday to be a national holiday, celebrated on the third Monday of each January hereafter.



