Division Avenue Road Construction Nearing Completion

Road Construction on Division Avenue from US1 to S. Beach Street is nearing completion. South Ridgewood Avenue at Division remains open to traffic. The 12" water main extension from S. Beach Street to and across US1 has been completed and cleared for service allowing the contractor to go full steam ahead on the remaining road work. The majority of the curb, gutter and sidewalk improvements have been con-

structed. Asphalt milling is completed and the majority of road base has been placed. What previously was a torn up construction site has now begun to appear as a new road. The section of Division Avenue from S. Ridgewood Avenue to US1 is expected to be paved and open to traffic by September 21, 2009, with the entire section from US1 to S. Beach Street open by October 5, 2009.

WWTP Chlorine Contact Tank Cleaning

Periodically (approximately twice per year) Wastewater Treatment Plant Operations staff must clean algae growth from wall and floors of

the chlorine contact – equalization tanks at the facility. If left unchecked, the algae will encourage regrowth of undesirable organisms resulting in plant compliance levels exceeding the City's regulatory limit for reuse distribution and effluent outfall standards. City plant operations staff performed the cleaning operations with assistance

and the reverse osmosis concentrate flow received from the water plant through a bypass channel and alternate piping array to the river outfall. The remaining tank effluent level is then completely drained with the use of a pump and large hoses and discharged back to the head (or beginning) of the wastewater plant. Previous tank cleaning operations required that a service disruption notification be prepared and distributed to Peninsula and Beach Street area reuse customers due to inadequate storage and out



from the wastewater collection system crews. Work involves a bypass of these tanks via re-route of the wastewater treatment effluent flow

dated pumping configurations in place at the time. As a result of the completion of our new 4 Million Gallon Reuse Storage Tank and High Service Pumping Facility, no service disruptions were realized by our customers.

Pressure and Flow Control Valve Installation

The City Commission recently awarded Masci General Contractors a contract for furnishing and installing variable frequency drives for motor controls for three 125 horsepower high service pump motors at the water treatment plant facility. Included in the project scope is the installation of an altitude valve (or pressure-flow control valve). The system was designed by Quentin L. Hampton Associates (QLH). Installation of the motor drives will enable the pump-motor combination to be programmed to deliver a desired pressure setting for various system water demand conditions encountered throughout the day. Water distribution system delivery pressure at the plant is currently limited to approximately 70 pounds per square inch (psi) due to the



overall plant operating pressure capability provides improved reliability in the distribution system for meeting pressure needs during high flow demand periods. Installation of an automated altitude valve will prevent the tank from overflowing at pressures above 70 psi, allowing operator adjustments to increase plant pressures when the need dictates.

Water plant operations and distribution staff coordinated minor piping modifications due to buried conflicts found and performed switchover from west to east plant bypass piping to distribution system to accommodate the contractor activities. The new altitude and isolation valves were

installed this week near the tank site.

William E. "Skip" Irby, Interim Fire Chief, has been appointed Fire Chief for the City of Ormond Beach. Skip has over 30 years experience in the fire service. In September 2003, he was hired as a Fire Division Chief and then one year later promoted to Assistant Fire Chief. In February 2009, he was appointed Interim Fire Chief upon the retirement of the former Fire Chief.

Before coming to Ormond Beach, Skip served with the Gainesville Fire Rescue as Deputy Fire Chief, District Chief of Operations, and District Chief of Training and Emergency Medical Services.

He was with the Gainesville Fire Rescue for 25 years. He holds an AS Degree in Emergency Medical Services from Santa Fe Community College along with numerous training and education certifications and has been a member of the Florida Fire Chief's Association since 1989.

City Manager Joyce Shanahan stated, "Mr. Irby has been a great Interim Fire Chief, and I welcome him to his new position. He clearly has many challenges ahead as we face the changing landscape of fire service delivery, but I believe he is up to the tasks"




Citizens Cast Their Ballots
