Memorial Day Remembrance



Hundreds of men, women and children will gather in Rockefeller Gardens on Monday, May 30th, in loving memory of those whose supreme sacrifice has protected the privileges we enjoy as a nation. Our debt can never be paid as acknowledged by the increasing number of faithful citizens and visitors each year who attend the Memorial Remembrance Services.

Whether a guest feels the overwhelming pride that is common at this event or feels a tear rolling down their cheek as some do each year, the most meaningful tribute that can be paid to our fallen heroes is found in being among other caring citizens to honor those who years ago, or as recently as today, have made the supreme sacrifice.

Weeks of preparation by the volunteer Memorial Remembrance Committee and City staff has made this an increasingly popular and widely respected event.

Dignity, respect and love describe the humility with which this annual program is presented. The uncompromised purpose is to honor the selflessness and bravery with which over a million men and women throughout our history have laid down their lives for our freedom.

Ninety minutes of heart grasping sights and sounds will fill Rockefeller Gardens starting at 9:00 a.m. when Charles Long conducts the members of the Daytona Beach Concert Band.

Victoria Leignadier, Colonel, US Army (retired), will serve as the Memorial Remembrance moderator.

Attendees will be welcomed by The Honorable Ed Kelley, Mayor of Ormond Beach.

The invocation will be rendered by Rabbi Howard Schwartz, US Army Major (retired) and the benediction by Reverend Willie Branch.

Symbols of liberty will overflow into every corner of Rockefeller Gardens as numerous military color guards and color corps enter and assume their positions. Additional groups, including Boy and Girl Scouts will join them.

Guest speaker for the 2016 event is Lieutenant Colonel (LTC) Garret K. Messner, United States Army, Retired. LTC Messner is a native of Santa Monica, California. Raised in an Air Force family, he began his Army service in 1988. Following his graduation from West Point, LTC Messner commissioned in the regular Army as an Aviation Officer.

LTC Messner spent the majority of his career serving in the 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment (Airborne). He commanded two Special Operations Aviation companies, served as the Regimental operations officer, a Battalion S3 and was instrumental in expanding the Regiment to its current size. While assigned to the 160th SOAR, he spent more than 3 years deployed to combat in Afghanistan and the Philippines. He flew MH-47s and MH-6s earning the Bronze Star

(with oak leaf cluster) and multiple Air Medals.

LTC Messner retired from the Army at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in 2016 after spending four years as the Professor of Military Science and Commander of the Army ROTC program. As the Professor of Military Science, he expanded the Army ROTC from 150 Cadets to 250 Cadets. When he retired from Embry-Riddle, the program was ranked in the top 10 out of 275 Programs in the nation.

Prior to reporting to Embry-Riddle, LTC Messner served as the Chief of the Sensitive Activities Branch, Deputy Director of Special Operations, J3, Joint Staff at the Pentagon. He was directly responsible for developing, preparing, staffing and coordinating world-wide special operations, UAV and cyber operations and policy with the White House, The Joint Staff, Office of the Secretary of Defense, Military Services, Combatant Commands, CIA, FBI, and the Department of State.

LTC Messner is a graduate of the United States Military Academy, has earned Masters of Science degrees from both Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and the United States Army Command and General Staff College, and completed a national security fellowship with the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He will complete his PhD this fall. Additionally, LTC Messner is an Army Master Aviator with over 3600 flight hours. He also earned the Ranger tab and the Airborne and Air Assault badges.

LTC Messner retired to Ormond Beach and is a Financial Planner for First Command Financial Services in Ormond Beach. He has been married for 24 years to his lovely wife Stephanie and they have three beautiful children – Morgan (Attending Brigham Young University), McKay (Seabreeze High School), and Malinda (Ormond Beach Middle School).

Guests will have been given a carnation on arrival at Rockefeller Gardens. A final tribute is rendered as they move forward in procession, to place their flower beside the Memorial Marker as a personal “thank you” to those who made the supreme sacrifice.

As the last flower is placed, we the free will have honored the fallen with love, humility, and gratitude.

This annual Memorial Remembrance Service takes place at 9:00 a.m. on Monday, May 30, at Rockefeller Gardens, 26 Riverside Drive in Ormond Beach. Rockefeller Gardens is at the southeast corner of Granada Boulevard (State Road 40) and Riverside Drive on the peninsula side of the Granada Bridge, and in front of The Casements. Parking will be available at The Casements, Fortunato Park, and the Ormond Memorial Art Museum.

In the event inclement weather threatens the outdoor festivities, the service will be held inside The Casements with a shortened program and limited seating.

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Week

At the time, EMS was a new profession, and practitioners were just beginning to be recognized as a critical factor in emergency medicine responding to public need.

EMS is now considered essential to emergency medical care. Each day,

EMS practitioners help save lives by responding to a wide variety of medical emergencies. EMS may provide both basic and advanced medical care at an emergency scene and on the way to the hospital. EMS practitioners care for a patient's medical needs and are caring and compassionate at the most difficult times.

In honor of EMS Week, the Florida Emergency Medical Services for Children Advisory Committee (EMSC) has joined forces with Florida EMS personnel to present a water safety lesson for children ages 2-6. This week, Ormond Beach firefighters are visiting elementary schools reading "Stewie the Duck Learns to Swim" to kindergarteners and answering their questions. The book will be left with the school to continue to share the lesson along with copies of the water safety song, a coloring activity book, and a water watcher tag (for adults). A flier will be sent home with the children for the parents explaining the water safety lesson their child received.

Ormond Beach Receives 2016 Playful City USA Designation

10th YEAR



The City of Ormond Beach is being honored with a 2016 Playful City USA designation for the fifth consecutive year. Celebrating its 10th anniversary, KaBOOM!, the national recognition program honors cities and towns across the country for making their cities more playable.

Mayor Ed Kelley said, "Ormond Beach is honored to be recognized for the fifth year as a Playful City USA. We consistently work to provide the best recreational amenities and opportunities for all our citizens and are extremely fortunate to live in a community with 47 beautiful parks and the highest quality recreational facilities comprising nearly 600 acres."

Communities across our nation are creating innovative ways to bring back play and attract residents through family friendly activities. Interactive sidewalk art, designated play spaces on trails and the transformation of schoolyards into active play areas are just a few examples of how cities are becoming more playful.

"We are thrilled to recognize these communities that have invested their time and efforts to put kids first," said KaBOOM! CEO James Siegal. "Balanced and active play is crucial to the well-being of kids and the communities that they thrive in. By integrating play into cities, the leaders of Playful Cities USA are working to attract and retain the thousands of families that want homes in close proximity to safe places to play."

Ormond Beach is the only city in Volusia County with the 2016 designation and was selected for its continued outstanding dedication to play. Since 1974, Ormond Beach has had a joint use agreement with Volusia County Schools allowing children the opportunity to use the playgrounds, basketball courts, tennis courts, handball courts, and other facilities during after school hours for free and open play. The City's recently added "Play-Unplugged" after school program is a new program which increases play for children aged 4-14 and gets them to put down their electronic devices and "*play-unplugged*" sports, obstacle courses, board games, creative arts and much more. Recreation builds strong families, promotes social harmony, and is a source of community pride and identity and Ormond Beach is committed to continually enhancing the quality of life for its residents and building a strong, active and playful community.

The 2016 honorees hail from 43 states, and the District of Columbia, for a total of 257 Playful City USA designations. For the tenth consecutive year, Florida paced the nation with 31 Playful City USA communities. California earned second-place with 28 communities, while Texas finished third with 19 Playful City USA communities.


