Item #1 – Meeting Call to Order

Mayor Kelley called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m.

Item #2 – Invocation

Pastor Ronald Todd, Harbor Baptist Church, gave the invocation.

Item #3 – Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Kelley led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Item #4A – Pop Warner Academic All Americans

Mayor Kelley explained that Pop Warner was the largest youth football and cheerleading organization and that participants were required to maintain academic standards in order to participate. He stated that the Ormond Beach Pop Warner Sandcrabs Youth Football and Cheerleading Association had been participating in cheerleading and football activities since the year 2000. He stated that in those 13 seasons there had been many cheerleading squads and football teams that had won championships at the state and regional levels. He stated that the parents, fans, and organization members were proud of the accomplishments on the field and the sidelines but were most proud of the accomplishments off the field and in the classroom. He stated that the Ormond Beach Sandcrabs produced over 50 students who qualified as Academic All Americans, with two students in the top 35 in their grade in the nation. He noted that Ormond Beach had one of the highest totals of Academic All Americans in the state of Florida. He proclaimed May 7, 2013, as a day to recognize Pop Warner Academic All Americans in the City of Ormond Beach. He presented their coach with the proclamation and certificates for each child.

Item #4B – Mayor’s Health & Fitness Challenge – 1st Place Winners

Mayor Kelley joked that he had been prepared to present himself with a prize but unfortunately someone else had beaten him. He stated that the 1st place winner in the category of “Greatest Weight Loss” and in the category of “Greatest Percentage of Weight Loss” was Mr. Bob Coleman. He presented Mr. Coleman with two certificates and two envelopes each containing \$500, one for each first place win. He stated that Mr. Coleman lost a total of 38 pounds in the 12-week program.

Mr. Coleman stated that he originally only reluctantly went to the challenge because his wife requested that he go. He stated that when he went and saw the resources made available from the city and from sponsors such as Florida Hospital and Florida Health Care, and the excitement that Risk Manager Christina Maguire created, he became convinced to participate fully. He stated that the program was an example of good government and noted that instead of passing a law the city provided leadership and incentive. He stated that he had changed his lifestyle and eating habits. He stated that he was living on a variable income and could use the \$1,000 prize money. He noted

that Ms. Claris Mac'Kie, Executive Director of Family Renew Community, had made a very impassioned speech at The Casements recently. He stated that Ms. Mac'Kie and Family Renew Community could use the money more than him and he donated it to them at the meeting.

Mayor Kelley stated that Mr. Coleman lost to win and could not give his money to a more deserving cause. He thanked Mr. Coleman. He noted that over 500 pounds of clothes were also donated to Family Renew Community.

Ms. Mac'Kie asked Ms. Maguire to come forward. She stated that Ms. Maguire did an amazing job of coordinating the challenge and presented her with an award of excellence from Family Renew Community. She also presented a certificate of achievement to Mayor Kelley in honor of his leadership and dedication. She also expressed her appreciation to Florida Health Care.

Mayor Kelley stated that he could not have done the challenge without Ms. Maguire and without the partners. He stated that the 1st place winner in the "Fitness Challenge" category was City Clerk Scott McKee. He presented Mr. McKee with a certificate and \$500 prize.

Mayor Kelley stated that he hoped that everyone would consider passing the word along that the challenge would be held again next year. He noted that they were currently considering a six month extension for those that participated to be held between now and the next challenge. He stated that Mr. Coleman had told him that the challenge changed his life.

Mayor Kelley presented Ms. Maguire with flowers and a gift certificate. He explained that Ms. Maguire had developed and took full ownership of the 90-day challenge and assembled a team of health care providers, fitness representatives, staff members, and committees. He noted that to increase awareness she had scheduled the Mayor's Mile Fitness Walks several weeks before the inaugural challenge began with a health fair at Rockefeller Gardens. He stated that fitness events were held throughout the 90-day challenge. He stated that Ms. Maguire worked 60-hour weeks soliciting volunteers, business partners, and sponsorships for prizes; and regularly communicated with challengers to ensure that they were informed of events and kept focused and motivated. He stated that it was Ms. Maguire's organization skills, attention to detail, and commitment that made the challenge a success. He proclaimed May 7, 2013, as a day to recognize Ms. Maguire in the City of Ormond Beach and presented her with the proclamation.

Item #4C – Service Recognition – Darrell Brock

Mayor Kelley stated that Mr. Brock had served on the Police Officers' Pension Board from December 12, 1986, to March 14, 2013, nearly 27 years. He noted that Mr. Brock was not paid for that service. He stated that those who volunteered to serve in the community and give their time, which was irreplaceable, was what made Ormond Beach special. He thanked Mr. Brock for his service and leadership and presented him with a plaque.

Item #4D – Employee of the Quarter – Sylvia Frost

Ms. Joyce Shanahan, City Manager, stated that it was her pleasure to announce that the Employee of the Quarter was Ms. Sylvia Frost. She stated that Ms. Frost began her career with the city in 1986 as an office assistant in the building department and that one year later she was promoted and transferred to the city's Recreation/Leisure Services Department, where she has remained for over 25 years. She stated that Ms. Frost has served as the right hand for the department's various directors over the years under various titles, including her current title of Office Manager. She stated that Ms. Frost had enhanced the quality of life in Ormond Beach through her community service efforts. She explained that recently, Ms. Frost was an integral part of the Project ROMP Committee, where she served as chair of the Volunteer Committee and helped see the Magic Forest Playground Renovation Project finally come to fruition. She stated that Ms. Frost had also been a long time participant in the City Santa Program, which raised funds to provide holiday gifts to children and seniors in need. She noted that Ms. Frost also received the city's 2010 Above and Beyond Award in recognition of her willingness to go the extra mile by assisting citizen groups that wished to partner with the city in working on special projects. She stated that Project ROMP was a great effort of volunteers and without Ms. Frost's coordination, it would have been nearly impossible.

Mayor Kelley presented Ms. Frost with a plaque for her award, showed her the plaques that would be displayed in the atrium, and presented her with a watch from the city.

Item #4E – Emergency Medical Services Week

Mayor Kelley stated that the members of Ormond Beach Fire Department were ready to provide life saving care to those in need 24 hours a day, seven days a week. He stated that Emergency Medical Services (EMS) played a critical role in outreach and injury prevention. He explained that the EMS System consisted of emergency physicians, emergency nurses, emergency medical technicians and paramedics, firefighters, educators, and administrators. He stated that the members of the Ormond Beach Fire Department engaged in thousands of hours of specialized training and continuing education to enhance their lifesavings skills. He stated that it was appropriate to recognize the accomplishments of the Ormond Beach Fire Department Emergency Medical Services practitioners by designating Emergency Medical Services Week. He proclaimed May 19-25, 2013, as Emergency Medical Services Week and recognized the Ormond Beach Fire Department for their outstanding emergency medical care to the citizens of the community.

Mayor Kelley presented the Fire Department Engine Crew from Station 93 with the proclamation. He noted that having been a recipient of their care, he could testify to its effectiveness. He stated that they did a fantastic job and were well appreciated.

Item #5– Audience Remarks

Mr. Jim Schultz, 117 Harvard Drive, stated that fluoridation was currently a topic in Portland, Oregon. He stated that their Commission had voted for fluoridation and within a month different organizations presented signatures that were required to bring the issue to a vote from the public. He stated that there had been well over \$1 million spent on the issue, the great majority of which was for fluoridation and almost all of which came from the American Dental Association groups. He noted that in Bellingham, Washington, the same groups had donated almost \$1 million to pro-fluoridation causes and had lost the vote. He stated that he was not saying that would happen in Portland but explained that their local news station carried an exposé on fluoridation whereby the health department data was reported to be inaccurate. He stated that Portland actually had better teeth than many of the surrounding areas which did fluoridate. He noted that information was not being shared. He stated that the NAACP in Portland came out against fluoridation and several studies had shown that fluoridation affected African Americans more.

Item #6A – Approval of Minutes

Mayor Kelley advised that the minutes of the April 16, 2013, regular meeting had been sent to the Commission for review, and were on the city’s website for public viewing. He asked for any corrections, additions, or omissions. He stated that hearing no corrections, the minutes would stand approved as presented.

Item #7 – Consent Agenda

Mayor Kelley advised that the actions proposed for the items on the Consent Agenda were so stated on the agenda. He asked if any member of the Commission had questions or wished to discuss any items separately.

Item #9 – Reports, Suggestions, Requests

Upcoming Meetings

Ms. Shanahan stated that on May 21, 2013, at 5:30 p.m. there would be a Town Hall Budget Meeting in the Commission Chambers. She stated that the regular Commission meeting would follow at 7:00 p.m.

Ms. Shanahan stated that the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Workshop would be on Monday, June 3, 2013, at 5:30 p.m. at the Senior Center. She stated that the next day the regular City Commission meeting was scheduled for June 4, 2013, at 7:00 p.m. She stated that she did not know if the Commission had any interest in combining the

date of those two meetings and having them both on Monday, June 3, 2013. She explained that the Commission meeting could be started at 7:30 p.m. to allow time for the workshop. She stated that if the CIP Workshop was not completed, it could be continued prior to the next Commission meeting. She asked the Commission if they had any desire to amend the schedule as she had laid out.

Mayor Kelley stated that he would prefer to do that instead of meeting two nights back-to-back; whereby, Commissioner Kent stated that he was also in favor of that.

Ms. Shanahan stated that they would do a special announcement that the Commission meeting would start at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, June 3, 2013, and would decide if they wanted to continue to hold the CIP Workshop at the Senior Center or not.

Mayor Kelley clarified with City Attorney Randy Hayes that the City Commission could recess and reconvene the CIP Workshop, if they needed to in order to hold the City Commission meeting.

Granada Streetscape Improvements

Ms. Shanahan stated that paving was to be done last week but it was unable to go forward because of the rain. She stated that they would hopefully be finishing the paving by May 10 and would be doing a second coat of striping after the asphalt had cured, around May 23.

Andy Romano Beachfront Park

Ms. Shanahan stated that the thermal striping was done at the park. She stated that staff spoke to Volusia County Beach Patrol and they marked the travel lanes for emergency vehicles only. She stated that they assured the city that they would have conversations with beach vendors about not traveling through those lanes. She stated that the city would also be doing a contract to have someone help pick up the garbage at the park because it was proving to be too much for the city's two part-time workers to keep up with. She stated that the Leisure Services Advisory Board would also be looking at the issue of renting pavilions. She explained that they were finding that the park was filling up very rapidly and most of the parking was gone by 10:00 or 11:00 a.m. so it was creating a problem for those who had rented pavilions and then had no place to park. She stated that they were also going to see if there were creative ways to solve the parking issue. She stated that the success was beyond their wildest imaginations. She stated that they were planning on getting large professional photographs taken (when they could un-stake some of the palm trees) with the sun in the horizon late summer. She stated that the beachfront park was a wonderful place and that a country music video was filmed there over the weekend.

Litigation

Mr. Hayes stated that there were a couple of litigation matters, one involving Riverbend Golf Course and one involving Cheaters, which would be going to trial. He stated that he would be scheduling litigation shade meetings with the Commission to bring them up to speed on those matters.

Boy Scouts

Commissioner Kent thanked the Boy Scouts in attendance for attending, as he recognized one of his former students.

Mayor's Health & Fitness Challenge

Commissioner Kent stated that when Mr. McKee and Mr. Coleman received their awards, their wives were beaming and he wanted to tell them how fortunate they were to have that type of support.

Meeting Preparation

Commissioner Boehm stated that sometimes it seemed like the Commission quickly went through the meeting agenda. He stated that people may not realize that they had previously received a 548-page agenda packet to read and that they had the opportunity to ask the City Manager and city staff about any questions they had. He noted that items on the Consent Agenda did not require a public hearing to be held, which enabled them to approve them all together. He explained that the items could be pulled if the Commission still had questions or wished to have discussion with those items. He stated that the items were all substantive and substantial and made up a great deal of work that was done by city staff.

Boy Scouts / Utilities

Commissioner Boehm stated that for the benefit of the Boy Scouts, he also wanted to mention that the city processed 37.118 million gallons of water the previous week. He stated that they also processed 27.53 million gallons of wastewater. He explained that the city created 15.67 million gallons of re-use water that was being used in subdivisions and golf courses throughout the city in order to lessen the amount of potable water used in the city. He noted that one would not think of a city of Ormond Beach's size using or processing that many gallons of water in a week. He explained that Utilities Manager Dave Ponitz was in charge of doing all that. He stated that the Boy Scouts may want to someday take a tour of one of Mr. Ponitz's plants and see what the city did. He stated that a lot of what a city did was taken for granted such as water and sewer, landscaping, and bridges. He stated that the quality and service that the city had was attributable to the quality of the staff.

Playful City

Commissioner Boehm stated that the city was just named by a national organization as one of 217 "Playful Cities" in the United States. He stated that averages of four cities per state were selected. He stated that the designation was in recognition of the amount and type of programs, parks, and recreation available, which was a tribute to staff and Mr. Carolin.

Mayor's Health & Fitness Challenge

Commissioner Boehm stated that he made note of the fact that Mayor Kelley promised that next year he would do better than he did this year and that he would lose more than Mr. Coleman did. He stated that if Mayor Kelley stayed Mayor for another three or four years there would be nothing of him left if he continued to lose all that weight.

Commissioner Stowers' Absence at Next Meeting

Commissioner Stowers stated that he would be missing his first Commission meeting on May 21, 2013, and hoped that would be the only one he would ever miss. He stated that he would be attending the International Council of Shopping Centers Conference. He explained that he was going in his capacity as a land use attorney but had spoken to Economic Development Director Joe Mannarino and would be receiving some Ormond Beach materials and direction from him so that he could reach out to those attending. He stated that he hoped that he would return bearing good news in all regards.

Art in the Park

Commissioner Stowers stated that Art in the Park was the past weekend. He stated that there was a great turnout and that as always, events at The Casements were wonderful.

Boy Scouts

Mayor Kelley stated that he appreciated the Boy Scouts coming, as well. He thanked their Scout Leader for bringing them to see how government worked.

VCOG

Mayor Kelley stated that the Volusia Council of Governments (VCOG) was performing a 360 review. He noted that each member of the Commission had received a survey. He stated that if any of them had any comments or thoughts about VCOG and its relation with Volusia League of Cities it would be greatly appreciated. He stated that VCOG would be holding a workshop in June to discuss the results.

Florida Georgia Line

Mayor Kelley stated that his son's music group, Florida Georgia Line, shot a music video at the Andy Romano Beachfront Park the previous week. He stated that Commissioner Partington was in attendance.

Commissioner Partington stated that his daughters wanted him to take them and noted that it was essentially a mini-concert for Florida Georgia Line.

Mayor Kelley stated that he presented the group with a proclamation and keys to the city. He noted that the Mayor of Monroe, Georgia, which was where the other half of the duo was from, also did the same. He stated that the group was just nominated for three Country Music Television Awards.

Recognize Your Teacher Day

Mayor Kelley stated that he had the privilege of working with the Education Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, as the Teachers of the Quarter was presented today. He stated that it was a special day because it was also national "Recognize Your Teacher

Day.” He expressed his appreciate to Commissioner Kent, because teachers provided information to their students that opened the door to the future whereby their students became a contributing part of the community.
