#### Item #1 – Meeting Call to Order

Mayor Partington called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m.

#### Item #2 – Invocation

Chaplin Loreal McInnes, Florida Hospital, gave the invocation.

#### Item #3 – Pledge of Allegiance

Mayor Partington led the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### Item #4A – Women’s Lung Health Week

Mayor Partington invited Ms. Susan Kurtz with the American Lung Association to join him at the front. He stated that every seven minutes and thirty seconds, one woman in the U.S. lost her battle with lung cancer. He noted that lung cancer was the leading

cause of cancer deaths for women and men in the U.S. He stated that lung cancer was an especially serious threat to women who were being diagnosed at frightening rates, noting that every five minutes a woman in the United States was told that she had lung cancer. He stated that advocacy, increased awareness, and education could result in more and better treatment for women with lung cancer and other lung diseases, such as Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (“COPD”) and asthma, and would ultimately save lives. He stated that public support for research funding would result in better treatment and early detection methods that would ultimately save lives. He explained that LUNG FORCE was a national initiative led by the American Lung Association to defeat lung cancer.

Mayor Partington, on behalf of the City of Ormond Beach, proclaimed May 6 through May 12, 2018, as Women’s Lung Health Week and encouraged all residents to learn more about the detection and treatment of lung cancer.

Ms. Susan Kurtz, representative for the American Lung Association, thanked him for his support in the fight against lung cancer and for lung health. She encouraged everyone to be screened.

#### Item #4B – Waste Pro Workers Acknowledgment

Mayor Partington invited Mr. Eric Thomas, Mr. Ladarius Gardiner, and the representative from Waste Pro forward. He stated that Waste Pro was the private contractor in charge of solid waste, yard waste, and recycling pick up services to the residential customers in Ormond Beach, noting that their motto was “Caring for Our Communities”. He stated that on April 23, 2018, Mr. Thomas and Mr. Gardiner demonstrated that commitment to the community with their actions, while they were picking up recycling in the Lakebridge community. He noted that when they arrived at Oakwood Park, the crew smelled smoke and a neighbor alerted the team that there was a fire in one of the homes and the resident was still inside. He stated that Mr. Thomas, the driver, immediately took action and entered the building, went to the second floor and checked every room, but could not locate the resident. He stated that Mr. Thomas then came back out and asked if anyone had come out; the neighbor said no, but stated they had heard the resident coughing. He explained that Mr. Thomas then took off his shirt, wrapped it around his face to minimize breathing in the thick smoke, re-entered the smoke filled building and located the resident, unconscious, on the couch. He stated that as Mr. Thomas attempted to move the resident, the resident became alarmed and struggled. He noted that Mr. Thomas was able to get the resident to the doorway where his co-worker Mr. Gardiner assisted in lifting the resident and getting them outside the building and out of danger.

Mayor Partington stated that Mr. Thomas, Recycle Driver, had been with Waste Pro since the Ormond Beach Contract began in October of 2014 and he worked on the Ormond Beach contract for an additional 10 years with the prior contractor. He stated that Mr. Gardiner joined Waste Pro in May of 2016 and had been working in Ormond Beach since then. He noted that Mr. Gardiner was a full time student and close to graduating from Daytona State College.

Mayor Partington, on behalf of the City of Ormond Beach, proclaimed May 15, 2018, as a day to recognize Mr. Eric Thomas and Mr. Ladarius Gardiner and invited all residents to join him in paying tribute to the Waste Pro employees for their heroic efforts that saved the life of an Ormond Beach resident.

Mr. Shawn Jennings, representative of Waste Pro, stated that he had seen some incredible things from Waste Pro employees but noted that this instance was one of the most incredible. He thanked the city for allowing them to do business together and Mr. Thomas and Mr. Gardiner for the work they had done and the acts they showed for the city. He noted that he was grateful they were on the same team.

Mayor Partington stated that he relayed the story to a local restaurant in Ormond Beach and the owner was so impressed that he wanted to recognize the gentlemen as well. He invited Mr. Jimmy Hull forward and Mr. Hull presented both gentlemen with gift certificates to Hull’s Seafood Restaurant.

#### #4C – Pop Warner Football

Mayor Partington invited the Pop Warner coaches and students forward. He stated that Pop Warner was the nation’s largest youth football, and cheer and dance program with

approximately 325,000 participants in 42 states and 7 countries. He stated that Pop Warner programs sought to develop well-rounded young men and women who learned not only the fundamentals of football, cheerleading, and dance, but also the importance of education in an atmosphere conducive to developing sound character while having a good time. He noted that Pop Warner's commitment to academics was what separated the program from other youth sports requiring academic guidelines to participate. He stated that the most academically accomplished, a GPA greater than 96%, qualified as an All-American Scholar, and that the Ormond Beach Youth Football, and Cheerleading Association had been participating in football and cheerleading programs since the year 2000. He stated that although the parents and the Pop Warner organization were very proud of all of the successes on the fields and the sidelines, what they were most proud of were the accomplishments off of the field and in the classroom. He noted that in the current year the Ormond Beach SandCrabs had 29 Academic All-Americans, with seven students in the top 35 of their grade in the nation, five students on the Southeast Region list, seven Cheer and Dance, and 22 Football All-Conference Scholar winners.

Mayor Partington, on behalf of the City of Ormond Beach, proclaimed May 15, 2018, as a day to recognize the Pop Warner Academic All-Americans and encouraged all residents to join him in acknowledging the accomplishments of the young people as they continued their commitment to future accomplishments in and for the community. He congratulated the team and gave their coaches the certificates for distribution.

#### #4D – Public Works Week

Mayor Partington invited Public Works Director Gabe Menendez and staff forward. He noted that the public works staff made the city work on a day to day basis and dealt with many things the community took for granted. He stated that public works professionals focused on infrastructure, facilities, and services that were of vital importance to sustainable and resilient communities and to the public health, high quality of life, and well-being of the people of Ormond Beach. He stated that those infrastructure, facilities, and services could not be provided without the dedicated efforts of public works professionals, who were engineers, managers, and employees from state and local governments and the private sector, responsible for rebuilding, improving, and protecting the nation's transportation, water supply, water treatment, and solid waste systems, public buildings, and other structures and facilities essential for the citizens. He stated that it was in the public interest for the citizens, civic leaders, and children in Ormond Beach to gain knowledge of and to maintain a progressive interest and understanding of the importance of public works and public works programs in their respective communities. He noted that the American Public Works Association had celebrated the annual National Public Works Week since 1960.

Mayor Partington, on behalf of the City of Ormond Beach, proclaimed May 21 through May 27, 2018, as National Public Works Week and encouraged all residents to join with representatives of the American Public Works Association and government agencies in activities, event, and ceremonies designed to pay tribute to the public works professionals and to recognize the substantial contributions they made to protecting the national health, safety, and quality of life.

#### Item #5 – Audience Remarks

Mr. Jimmy Hull, 111 West Granada Boulevard, stated that he was born and raised in Ormond Beach and that it was a great place to live, work, play, raise a family, or retire. He stated that the Commission's leadership on planning and developing the vision for historic downtown Ormond Beach had been very successful, and that city staff had been informative, helpful, and a pleasure to work with. He explained that being in the seafood business from boat to table involved harvesting natural marine resources from the Halifax River, Tomoka River Basin, Bulow Creek estuaries and marshes, and that they were vital to all that he did. He stated that rivers, estuaries, and marshes were made up of a biological soup of microscopic bacteria at the bottom of the food chain to oysters to humans at the top. He stated there was a critical environmental balance and chemistry of river water that must be maintained for a healthy environment and fisheries production. He stated that the rivers in the area were some of the most beautiful and productive in the entire state. He noted that an example of where the biological soup could be found out of balance was 50 miles to the south in the Indian River Lagoon. He stated that leeching from septic tanks over time had caused massive destructive algae blooms, fish kills, and die-offs of bird life, manatees, and dolphins. He stated that the sewage fueled algae blooms had killed the natural resources of the Indian River Lagoon and the quality of life for the surrounding communities. He noted that scientists had

found that leeching septic tanks systems were the cause of the destruction, and every county along the Indian River Lagoon from Palm Beach County to Brevard County had committed to septic-to-sewer upgrades in waterway communities to improve the water quality and habitat along the Indian River Lagoon. He noted that everyone had the responsibility to protect, maintain, and improve the river for now and years to come. He recommended that when possible the Commission find a way to remove septic systems that would eventually destroy the river, its marine resources, jobs, and quality of life.

Mayor Partington stated that with Commissioner Selby's leadership and hard work from staff, the Commission was already working on the septic issue for the north peninsula.

Mr. Jeff Brock, 1838 John Anderson Drive, stated that he lived in the unincorporated area of the north peninsula, but asked for the Commission's consideration in funding the soft cause for the design of the expansion of the sewer system of Ormond Beach to serve the north peninsula. He noted that waterways in that area were very important and deemed an aquatic preserve, listing the Tomoka Basin and Intracoastal Waterway across from Tomoka State Park as part of that preserve. He stated that it was critical that waters were kept as clean as possible and agreed with the statements made by Mr. Hull.

Mr. Rob Merrell, 1638 John Anderson Drive, stated that he was raising the third generation of his family on the north peninsula and was vested in Ormond Beach. He agreed with the statements made by Mr. Hull as well. He stated that he would support anything that would be discussed in an upcoming workshop and was in favor of making the change to sewer.

Mr. Dennis Bayer, 1586 John Anderson Drive, stated that he thought Mr. Hull summarized the situation well. He noted that he himself had been a marine biologist before law school, emphasizing his understanding of the importance of ecology, and that it did not recognize city or county boundaries. He urged them to do whatever they could to assist the north peninsula with changing to sewers. He noted that the discussion about the Indian River Lagoon had been going on for 20 or 30 years, and that the focus now needed to be on the Tomoka Basin and getting rid of the septic tanks.

Mr. Jim Schultz, 117 Harvard Drive, stated that he had spent much time in the Intracoastal Waterway and that septic tanks were deadly to the environment over time.

Mr. Schultz discussed the issue of fluoridation, including the federal lawsuit that the Environmental Protection Agency tried to have thrown out but was not. He noted that it was being tried as a pollutant and not as anything else. He mentioned studies on IQ damage, neurotoxicity, and how it affected pregnant women.

#### Item #6 – Approval of Minutes

Mayor Partington advised that the minutes of the May 1, 2018, regular meeting had been sent to the Commission for review and posted on the city's website for public viewing. He asked for any corrections, additions, or omissions. He stated that hearing no corrections, the minutes would stand approved as presented.

#### Item #7 – Community Redevelopment Agency

Mayor Partington advised that the following items were Community Redevelopment items. He explained that the City Commission served as the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) of the city and must review the items and make a recommendation as the CRA.

Mayor Partington recessed the City Commission meeting, called the CRA meeting to order, and opened the public hearings, at 7:31 p.m.

He stated that it led to issues in permitting docks, so the amendment would formalize the process and gave city staff, county staff, and contractors the same regulations to apply.

Commissioner Selby wondered what would happen to a property that was annexed into the city, based on the standards between what the county allowed versus what the city allowed.

Mr. Spraker stated that it would be an existing nonconforming dock and that they could maintain and repair it in the current situation. He stated that if they needed to do a major repair, they could either conform to the new standards or apply for a variance to rebuild it to the prior standard.

Commissioner Selby wondered if that was a situation where the percentage of damage or repair triggered whether or not they could do it automatically; whereby, Mr. Spraker stated that was correct and would typically be over 50 percent of the entire structure if it were destroyed.

Mayor Partington wondered if there were an easy explanation for why the city allowed a six foot dock or why the county allowed an eight foot dock, as far as width was concerned.

Mr. Spraker stated that there was not, it was just the standard that each had. He stated that the city dock regulations tried to provide adequate space to enjoy a dock in the water, while not being a structure that dominated the water area.

Mayor Partington brought up the difference in height requirements for each; whereby, Mr. Spraker stated that he thought they would look at that standard also based on some of the dock contractors.

Item #10 – Reports, Suggestions, Requests

Congrats

Ms. Joyce Shanahan, City Manager, echoed Commissioners comments about Ms. McGuire being nominated as Administrative Professional of the Year for Volusia County. She noted that Ms. Lori Koplín, from the parks and recreation program, was nominated and awarded the Recreation Person of the Year for Volusia County. She noted that she was excited for the nominations and that everyone would be celebrated on May 24, 2018.

Septic-to-Sewer

Ms. Shanahan commented about septic-to-sewer, noting that the Commission was forward thinking and that issue had been part of the master plan for a ten year conversion for septic-to-sewer for the north peninsula. She stated that there had been several discussions in meetings and workshops about it and that it would be brought forward during the Capital Improvements Program Workshop in June with all of the Capital Improvements for the next five years. She believed there were two septic-to-sewer items on the workshop agenda that would be considered for future years.

Hurricane Irma - Boat

Ms. Shanahan stated that Hurricane Irma provided many challenges and one was a boat that had been deposited right near a dock near Forest Hills. She thanked Public Works Director Gabe Menendez and the City Attorney's department for working out a resolution. She noted the city was able to obtain a Florida Inland Navigation Grant to remove the boat, which was matched by Volusia County. She stated that it took three days instead of one day, and that the boat was significantly wedged in the water and muck which created a vacuum. She stated that the towing company was finally able to move it and did not do any damage to the dock. She noted there was a Florida registration number on the boat and that it happened to be the same boat that was moored off Holly Hill. She stated that it was great work by staff in assisting to remove the boat for that resident and that it would have cost the resident thousands of dollars.

Transportation

Ms. Shanahan thanked the Commission for their time in the Transportation Update Workshop that evening. She stated that transportation continued to be a high priority and that staff had their marching orders, noting that they would not be nice anymore and would work hard to secure additional funding needed.

Septic-to-Sewer

Commissioner Selby stated that he encouraged the four speakers to come and voice their opinions on the septic-to-sewer issue that evening, since all were acquaintances of his and lived on the Intracoastal Waterway. He noted that he was passionate about septic-to-sewer.

Impact Fees

Commissioner Selby stated that there had been a lot of discussion at the county level about the potential half-cent sales tax. He stated he had recently been involved in looking at building workforce housing in a certain area in Ormond Beach. He discovered that impact fees for a single family house in that area would be approximately \$7,000 for the city and \$5,000 for the county. He noted that the house he planned would be sold for around \$175,000 and under \$200,000. He thought that if the Commission were to look at adjusting impact fees down the road, they should look at a concept of graduating the fees and tying them more towards the value of the home that was being built. He noted that he could argue the issue both ways. He stated that a million dollar house on the ocean and a \$200,000 house had the same impact, but the reality was the impact fees were really just impact taxes. He stated that he could personally support a methodology that might generate the same number of dollars, but obtained it in a way that made it easier for all to afford them. He noted that made it easier to develop workforce housing

so that police, fire, paramedics, teachers, single parents, nurses, etc. could live in the town that they worked in.

#### Transportation

Commissioner Selby stated that he had not paid attention to who the transportation liaison was until that evening and thought it was an excellent choice.

#### The Voice

Commissioner Selby stated that Mr. Kaleb Lee had performed the prior night and that it was a big night. He noted that the group would go from eight to four people, who would officially be in the finals. He suggested that everyone download Mr. Lee's song.

#### Ormond Beach

Commissioner Kent wondered at times what Ormond Beach was. He stated that it was a town where his son could get second place in the Donut Dash 5K and stop to eat a Krispy Kreme Donut on the way, while supporting the local Police Athletic League (PAL). He noted that it was a town that had the absolute best beachfront park in the entire state of Florida, indicating that it was Andy Romano Beachfront Park. He stated that the town had one of the lowest tax rates around as well as one of the lowest water and sewer rates. He noted that Ormond Beach was second to none in recreation. He stated that there was a wildly successful program at The Casements, where the first Friday of every month everyone could show up and watch a free movie. He stated that there were free fishing tournaments, including one on the beach on Saturday, June 16, 2018, and that it would be a celebration to see what everyone caught. He emphasized that Ormond Beach was a town that had a garbage contractor crew that went into burning buildings and saved people.

#### Police Department Annual Awards

Commissioner Boehm stated that he attended the Police Department's Annual Awards Ceremony the prior week. He stated that individuals did not always appreciate the number of different events that the police were involved in and the number of heroic or selfless things they did. He stated that it was heartwarming to see.

#### Donut Dash 5K

Commissioner Boehm stated that he, Mayor Partington, and Commissioner Kent walked at the back of the pack in the Second Annual Donut Dash 5K at the Trails Shopping Center. He noted that they were rolling up the sidewalks, but that all of them did finish the race. He stated that they had a great time and the donuts were good.

#### Art in the Park

Commissioner Boehm noted that the weather was not great for Art in the Park, but that it was a sold out event with a large numbers of vendors. He stated that it was interesting to see the variety and types of art there, and that city staff did a magnificent job of planning it.

#### Memorial Day Ceremony

Commissioner Boehm stated that the Annual Memorial Day Ceremony would be Monday, May 28, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. in Rockefeller Gardens. He noted that as a veteran, that and Veterans Day were two very special days for him during the year. He stated that the city had always honored the veterans in different ways; ceremonies for Vietnam, World War II, and Korean War veterans, as well as the Memorial Gardens. He encouraged veterans and those who supported veterans to attend.

#### Neighborhood Improvement Division (NID)

Commissioner Littleton stated the Ormond Beach's NID was second to none and ahead of the game when he contacted them about issues. He thanked Mr. Chris Mason and staff for what they did.

#### Appreciation

Commissioner Littleton stated that he had been sick the prior week and probably would not have been able to attend if the Commission meeting had been scheduled that week. He stated that the Commission meetings were on the first and third Tuesday of each month, plus there were numerous other meetings throughout the month. He noted that he put in a lot of time in being a Commissioner, and really appreciated the other Commissioners' time and effort that they put into the job and commitments they had as part of it.

#### Donut Dash 5K

Mayor Partington stated that he walked with Commissioner Boehm and Commissioner Kent in the Donut Dash 5K, while displaying the medal that they received. He noted they finished it in a little over an hour and that he enjoyed the smiling faces and people enjoying the event. He noted it was a great opportunity to raise funds for PAL and that they did an amazing amount of things with a small amount of funds. He thought it was the best PAL in Florida, if not the nation.

#### Great Kids Hero Fest

Mayor Partington stated that on May 9, 2018, the Great Kids Learning Center presented their second annual Hero Fest at First United Methodist Church. He noted that he and School Board Member Carl Persis had the opportunity to welcome parents, families and friends of the young people. He stated he was proud to see city employees among the community heroes, including Officer Jay Brennan, Mr. Paul MacDonald, and Fire Chief Bob Mandarino. He noted that Fire Chief Mandarino had to have a division chief accept his award, as he was giving a presentation on hurricane preparedness and its importance at that time.

#### Awards Presentation

Mayor Partington stated that he attended the 26<sup>th</sup> Annual Herbert M. Davidson Award for Outstanding Community Service ceremony at the Daytona 500 Club, noting that he wanted to be there when Ms. Melissa Burt DeVriese was honored with the Young Leaders Award. He stated that she was the driving force behind Security First, which was a huge component of the Ormond Crossings future development. He noted that she worked as an assistant in the White House in her college years and heard other accomplishments that had gotten her to where she was currently as a young leader in the city. He noted the ceremony also honored Ms. Lesa France Kennedy, Chief Executive Officer of International Speedway Corporation, for everything that she and her family had done for the community.

#### National Junior Honor Society

Mayor Partington stated that on May 11, 2018, he had the opportunity to speak to the National Junior Honor Society at Ormond Beach Middle School with Principal Matt Krajewski and Assistant Principal (Commissioner) Troy Kent. He noted that they honored sixth, seventh, and eighth graders who focused on leadership, character, service, and citizenship. He stated that they were an amazing group of young people and that Ms. Sandra Murray was one of the leaders of that chapter.

#### Council on Aging

Mayor Partington stated that later that day he attended the 14<sup>th</sup> Annual Glenn and Connie Ritchey Community Service Awards at the Daytona 500 Club. He stated that the award was presented to the Bowler Family from Daytona Beverages, honoring them for all they did for the Council on Aging. He noted that Ormond Beach cooperated with the Council on Aging in a number of areas and was recognized for their efforts to keep senior citizens safe, happy, and healthy.

#### Peace Officers Memorial Day

Mayor Partington stated that May 15, 2018, was Peace Officers Memorial Day and was held annually in the U.S. in honor of federal, state, and local officers killed or disabled in the line of duty. He noted the idea came into effect on October 1, 1961, when Congress asked the President to designate that day to honor law enforcement officers and that each year, the President proclaimed May 15 as Peace Officers Memorial Day. He stated that he started thinking about Officer Robert Grim, a great police officer and human being, who was the only officer that had ever been killed in the line of duty in Ormond Beach. He explained that Officer Grim was struck by a car on November 13, 2004, while investigating a minor traffic accident and had been killed instantly, noting there was no such thing as a routine stop for police officers. He stated that Officer Grim was 60 years old, had joined the Ormond Beach police department in April 2003, but had served in a police role for 36 years including 23 years with the Daytona Beach Police Department. He noted that Officer Grim was survived at the time by a wife and three children. He read the statement made by the Public Information Officer for the Ormond Beach Police Department at that time about Officer Grim:

*“Just the kind of officer everyone looked up to, young and old. He was a good mentor for a lot of the officers here.”*

Mayor Partington suggested going to the Officer Down Memorial Page on the internet and looking up Officer Robert Grim. He stated there were heartfelt and appropriate condolences on there.
